Equine recurrent uveitis



- Equine recurrent uveitis (ERU or moon blindness) is the most common cause of vision loss in horses.
- Likely a complex autoimmune disease influenced by both genetic and environmental factors
- Appaloosas are 8x more likely to develop ERU than other breeds.
- Infectious organisms, such as *Leptospira spp*. have been associated with ERU.

What you can do to keep your horse healthy:

- The LP genetic test can be used to evaluate ERU risk in Appaloosas.
- Horses with 2 copies of the LP mutation are at higher risk of developing ERU than horses with no leopard spotting pattern.
- Horses who test *LP/LP* should have their eyes examined frequently by a veterinary ophthalmologist for early detection and treatment if and when inflammation is detected

Signs

Redness
Tearing
Squinting
Inflammation of the eye
Vision loss

Genetic & environmental factors
Infectious organisms such as Leptospira spp.

NSAIDs Corticosteroids Surgical options
