Pituitary Pars Intermedia Dysfunction (PPID)



What is pituitary pars intermedia dysfunction (PPID)?

- An age-related endocrine disorder common in older equids.
- Caused by degeneration of neurons that affect the production of hormones such as adrenocorticotropic hormone (ACTH).
- The only medication licensed for treatment is pergolide mesylate.
- There is no cure for PPID. Management through medication, diet, and exercise must be maintained for the life of the animal.

What you can do to keep your horse healthy:

- Monitor shedding and compare to herd mates to detect delayed shedding, especially in older horses.
- Look for decreased energy levels, a potbellied appearance, loss of topline, recurrent foot abscesses or other infections.
- Schedule regular veterinary examinations to help evaluate for gradual changes that may be easy to overlook.

Signs

Long, curly hair coat
Delayed shedding
Muscle loss
Abnormal thirst
Excessive urination
Lethargy
Laminitis

Endocrine disorder associated with aging

Treatment

Pergolide mesylate Diet and exercise management
